pestilence, the infamous Great Plague of London — the last major outbreak of bubonic plague to occur in the United Kingdom — first struck the district of St Giles in 1665 and went on to kill an estimated 100,000 people, about 15% of London's population. Owing to modern science, the etiology of bubonic plague is known to stem from *Yersinia*.
